### SCCS 2020-2021 SCHOOL YEAR

We hope this newsletter finds every Charger and their loved ones healthy and safe as we continue through uncertain times.

Last June, we saw the school year end with incredibly quiet hallways and classrooms. The summer saw the School, parents, students, and staff waiting anxiously to see how the school year would or would not start. There were many rules and changes the School needed to make to comply with the government mandates. St. Charles was fortunate enough to have a big, beautiful building to help meet compliance.

Some of the changes for the 2020-2021 school year were predictable and practicable such as portable handwash stations setup in hallways, the middle years teachers traveled to classrooms instead of the grades 6-8 students changing classes, desk top shields became the norm, and staff wore wireless mics to help project their voices through masks. Some of the class sizes made it difficult to keep student and staff as safe as possible, so the music room, the cafeteria, the library, and the basement of the 1913 building were all converted to classrooms for some of the larger grades to be spread out as much as possible. All extracurricular sports teams were canceled. Gym classes have been outdoors as much as possible, violin class continued as usual while choral class had to be revamped for most of the year to comply with the no-singing mandate to prevent unnecessary infection risk.

There have been some changes that have been felt through the whole community and has affected who St. Charles is at the core level. Parents of the little ones said their goodbyes at the front door. There was no waiting for your child in the front lobby of the school this year, parent access inside was kept to a minimum.

The volunteer opportunities were very minimal which is not the normal community feeling of the school. This also meant no Hot Dog Day (unthinkable!) or Pizza Day every Wednesday to keep unnecessary volunteers out of the building. All the School Assemblies, Masses and religious celebrations have been via Zoom. While the power of technology has been invaluable during the Pandemic and allowed ourselves to stay connected, it is only a substitution for face-to-face contact with each other that the St. Charles community is missing greatly.

The Public Health Guidelines moved 70% of the students to remote learning as of May 12, 2021. This created a challenging work situation for the teaching staff who each day teach a group of students in their classroom and then students at home through Zoom or Teams. The complete Remote Learning process from the Spring of 2020 provided many learned lessons ahead of this dual teaching process.

The Community is hopeful that sometime into the 2021-2022 school year the pendulum will swing back closer to prior to Covid-19.

Each of you and your families are in our prayers for your health and safety.

Brenda passed away June 19, 2020.

#### ALUMNI UPDATES AND MEMORIES

These are some of my memories of my years as a Boarder at St. Charles Convent from February 2, 1942 until my grade 12 graduation in June, 1953.

We had a daily routine to follow. Up at 6:30am. Sister rang a bell to wake us up and if you didn't get up she would ring the bell by your bed. Mass at 7:00, then breakfast and cleaning the building. We each had an assigned job to do, from dusting, cleaning the stairways and mopping the hardwood floors. Classes were from 9am until noon. Dinner at noon, recess. Classes from 1pm-4pm then a short lunch. We had a glass of milk with our lunch of which our parents paid extra for. Free time until 5pm, then we had study time, doing homework or finishing up a lesson until supper at 6pm. 7pm-9pm was also study time. Bedtime at 9pm. All classes were in English but we also were taught to read and write in French. As well, all prayers were said in both languages.

The Oblate Sisters taught us how to sew, knit, crotchet, embroider and other crafts. I still knit and crochet today. This was done usually on Saturdays. Sunday was visiting day in the Parlor located across from the Chapel. We could also write letters on Sunday. Some of the children didn't always see their parents weekly. I was fortunate that I saw my parents every Sunday after Church. As they belonged to St. Charles Parish in those days.

In May and June, we waxed and polished the hardwood floors. The

fun part was after we could slide down the fire escape which was located on the North side of the building. We usually started at the Music Room which was on the 2nd floor. It began at the dormitory and a heavy mattress was placed at the bottom for a soft landing. Once I did sprain my ankle. The fire escape which was enclosed was made of metal. Later it was removed and used as a slide on the river bank.

These are some of the things we did at recess and noon hour. Skipping, hopscotch, baseball, dodgeball. In the winter we slid down the hill on a toboggan or on large sheets of cardboard also on tin lids from the large containers that peanut butter came in. Sometimes the slide on the hill was iced so we would slide much faster. there was also a patch of ice cleared on the river so we could skate.

The dress code for school days, were a tunic and blouse, and Sundays we wore a black dress and white collar. Saturdays we wore what we liked.

Report cards were given out at the end of the month. We were given As and Bs for Religion, Conduct, Application and Neatness. If we received a B in Conduct or Application we couldn't go home for the weekend, which was once a month. On special occasions we would wear a "Blue Ribbon" on our left shoulder if we received an "A" in Conduct and Application.

The Oblate Sisters gave us a good

foundation in both religion and daily living.



We couldn't find a picture for this grad year.






