SCCS 2019-2020 SCHOOL YEAR

The 2019-20 school started out as a usual school year and then the world changed with Covid-19. Alumni may wonder 20 or 30 years from now what it was like during the Pandemic of 2020.

When the Department of Education mandated all schools close as of March 22, 2020, staff, parents, and students initially were told the closure would only last a few weeks which eventually turned into the remainder of the school year. Teachers quickly had to adapt to preparing websites, worksheets, and lessons that could downloaded at home watched on YouTube. Teachers were also readily available by phone or email to help students master concepts, hosting Zoom Meetings so students could connect with each other and to their teachers. Definitely a very different way of teaching than the hands on approach in the classrooms. Kudos to the staff during this time; they did the best job possible in a difficult circumstance and in a stressful, uncertain time.

All school activities were cancelled including the Rome trip, the annual School Musical, Track and Field, and most heartbreaking - the Kindergarten Graduation and Grade 8 Farewell. In typical St. Charles fashion, not celebrating the accomplishments of the Kinders and not saying a proper farewell to the Grade 8's, was not acceptable.

There were Graduation signs delivered to all the homes of both Kinder and Grade 8 students. The

Kinders had a special visit at each of their homes, with social distancing, by their teacher and both Principal Narynski and Vice-Principal Prettie, who were on hand to congratulate each Kinder for their hard work and let them know how much each of them has been missed.

The Grade 8's saw a car parade from all staff, Principal Narynski, and Vice-Principal Prettie whose vehicles were all decorated with blue and yellow pompoms and signs of congratulations. The SCCS car parade stopped at each Grade 8 home for a mini presentation that would not be complete without their final TRACK award and any further academic and/or sports awards. All the best to these Grade 8's who are extra special as the Class of 2020. Their strength and resilience will serve each of these young people well in their future endeavors.

The hallways don't feel the same right now. The School is patiently waiting for the kids to return, hopefully this fall, so the tradition of learning at St. Charles can continue. Best wishes to all of you and your families. We hope you continue to be safe and have an enjoyable summer!

St. Charles has been blessed again with staff who do not just educate students but help shape and form them into the people they are meant to be. One of our staff members has done just that for 40 years. As of this September...she has seen many roles throughout the years that have shaped and touched the lives of more than 1,000 students. Dorothy Gair is best known by alumni as THE kindergarten teacher at St. Charles. In the early 2000's the Board wanted to explore the very new and cutting edge idea of all day kinder – it was Mrs. Gair who jumped at the chance to create and pilot this program into what our kinders experience today. Since her 'retirement' as a classroom teacher in 2003, Mrs. Gair has been the most reliable substitute teacher, agreed to work term positions, and unplanned leaves of absence, she has been a mentor, an advisor, and a champion for the students she works with. The greatest gift to St. Charles and the students has been her continued commitment to the Guided Reading Program she helped to create with Mrs. Kathy Booth – a program

for which they both received the Outstanding Educator Award from the Reading Council of Winnipeg in May of 2010. With her most recent title of Literacy Consultant ...

Our Senior YCS carried out an experiment to discover how it feels to be handicapped. Valerie Collins volunteered to spend half a day blindfolded.


In the report she wrote that day during her typing class she shares the insight that she gained:





OUR TRIP TO THE PEACE GARDENS




On Tuesday May 12, 1970, a group of 50 students left for the Peace Garden and a historical and geographical trip of southern Manitoba.


