# **Memories of St. Charles**

### -by Kathy Booth-Smith ('71-'75)

My earliest memories of this great school go way back to my first day as a newcomer. We had just moved to Winnipeg from Montreal a few months earlier, and things just weren't going well in the public school up the street. I was eleven years old and in grade 5. I distinctly remember entering the schoolyard on a very cold November morning, as a shy and tentative girl. I think I made it to the recess door, but was immediately surrounded by other students, who asked if I was the new girl named Kathy. I nodded, and that's all it took to be immediately welcomed and accepted by my new classmates. They smiled and laughed and asked me a million questions, as they led me into the playroom. It was like floating on a magical cloud! All of my apprehensions left me in an instant. and it felt like home.

My husband's memories are similar. He had been attending public school, after a short stint at St. John's Ravenscourt, and things just weren't going well. He entered St. Charles in grade 7, with a few friends, and a lot of difficulties. He had tried his best at every school, but couldn't seem to get the hang of academic expectations. It was just too hard to sit and listen, let alone do all that work! Doug and I had very different issues coming to our new school, but our experiences there shaped our lives in infinitely positive ways. We believe it was the overwhelming warmth and acceptance that had the greatest impact. I know we were both encouraged and directed to face and conquer our challenges, with the strong knowledge that the adults in our school life cared as much as our own parents. We were able to be ourselves, but better, as time went on. There was a sense of endless nurturing that went far above curricular outcomes, with more than enough fun and laughter, too! Ultimately, it was as if we had a whole other family to depend on.

So, even though we attended St. Charles for only a few short years, Doug and I went on with our lives with a greater understanding of ourselves and others. We met again many years later, and decided to build a future together. We planned every aspect of our life, but NEVER had to discuss where we would send our children to school—that was a given—in so many ways.



As it turned out, I began a teaching position at the school, which confirmed our prior beliefs about this amazing place. Since then, we have had the absolute pleasure of watching our two daughters grow first in Academy Kids Daycare, also run by alumnae, and then the school for many years. We were able to observe and be a part of the magic touch on our own children, and continue to this day, to reap the benefits of our choice of school for them.

And so the magic goes on, as I see every single day at work, and I feel the impact on other families. BRAVO, St. Charles School! We owe you BIG TIME!

P.S. Doug went on to conquer his serious school challenges later in life, and with the confidence given to him in junior high, became a teacher himself. Now, he does the mentoring, as well as "directing" to get those assignments in! How ironic....

Kathy has been teaching at St. Charles Catholic School since 1986 and continues to teach in Grade 3 today.

It is with sadness we offer our condolences to the Keough family on the passing of John James Keough.

Mr. Keough attended St. Charles Convent for grades one, two and three (1917, 1918 and 1919) and was one of the longest living students of St. Charles. John travelled to school by streetcar, getting off at Portage Avenue and St. Charles Street, he would walk down to the convent.

He remembered the old part of the convent, and the school being in the basement with several grades in one classroom.


The desks were doubleseated and if you misbehaved, you had to sit with a girl (not a choice thing to have to done in those days). He recalled one time when that occurred and how they both cried and cried (he conveniently can't remember who was the guilty one).

John married Helene Lamarre at St. Charles R.C. Church in 1938 and raised six children: Jim, Louise, Maureen, Kathleen, Dennis, Janine. They all attended St. Charles Convent. John went on to become a successful businessman in Headingley, Manitoba and the surrounding areas. He owned and operated a wood/coal delivery service and B.A. Oil distributorship for 35 years, culminating his career with the purchase of a local service station. He retired in the early 1970's. He was a long time member of St. Charles R.C. Church where he was baptized. received his First Communion, was confirmed and later married.

# Sr. Emma's Corner

#### Founders' Day

In 2003 we felt it was important to establish a Founders' Day "to celebrate the Order of reliaious who founded our school in 1906 and to reenkindle our mission." This is in line with the idea of re-founding I wrote about in a previous article: "Re-founding is going back to our roots. to the charism, mission and spirit of our founders and looking at how we can live these in today's world." The feast of the Sacred Heart was chosen as the date on which we celebrate Founders' Dav as it is a major feast for the Oblate Sisters whose full name is Missionary Oblates of the Sacred Heart and of Mary Immaculate.

How will we celebrate Founders' Day on June 11, 2010?

The day will begin with a prayer service in our school gym during which a statue of the Sacred Heart is carried in followed by the pictures of

Archbishop Langevin, Mother St-Viateur and Mother MarieJoseph, our founders. A short reflection during the prayer service explains the reason for this celebration:

Because Archbishop Langevin. Mother St-Viateur and Mother Marie-Joseph lived in faithfulness and trust we are still able to receive a Catholic education at St. Charles I04 years after it first opened its doors. Through the good times and the hard times the founders believed that St. Charles was God's will and they never gave up. Today, we celebrate their faith, trust and courage and thank God who inspired them to answer His call to meet the needs of the people of St. Charles. We ask them to help us live the motto of our school, "Estote Fideles", "Be Faithful".

During the afternoon the teachers will take their classes on a walking tour of our school's history: down the street to the house which once belonged to the school - Nazareth - serving as a dormitory for the high school girls and for home economics classes by the river where the old rectory used to be in the church cemetery to remember and pray for the deceased members of our founding families -Lafleche, Caron, Keough, etc.Our Gr. 8 students will have the privilege of going up to the bell tower.

This walk down memory lane will hopefully help our students understand better where we come from and appreciate all the sacrifices and dedication that were needed to establish our school which is offering them a Catholic education.

#### Year for Priests

On the same day we will be concluding the Year For Priests. We will again gather in the gym for an assembly giving thanks to God for the great gift of the priesthood.

Archbishop Weisgerber and our parish priests will be invited to attend. Our Gr. 6 -8 students will then welcome a panel of priests – Archbishop Weisgerber and two other priests – who will tell their stories and answer any questions the students may have.

This year for priests has been a great opportunity for us to focus on the role of the priests in our life. It has been a call for us to pray for and support our priests whose ministry is essential for the Church. Let us pray that more young men will hear and answer the call to serve God's people.

### **Student Reflection on Thinkfast Experience**

"THINKfast was an excellent experience, an activity that shows students what it is like to go without food for 24 hours. The students at St. Charles experienced how the people in poverty feel everyday, a sensation that throbbed in your head and stomach. Also, it created an emotion that made students feel like just stopping and having a nap. It made us all feel really hungry.

However, it was not all just hard work though, and we also played many educational games. My two favourite games were the Corn Game and the Bead Game. During the Corn Game, we were split into the continents of Asia, North

Europe and Africa. We had to guess how many people lived in these places and how many bags of corn the people had to share. None of us got the right answers because the world's food distribution is so uneven over the groups. During the Bead Game, we got an amount of coloured beads and a list that told us what we have to get/trade. We also had to give one red and one yellow bead to the activity leader, who represented how people have to work hard to get their food and resources, but then have give to their governments some of what they had earned or grown.

When I signed up, I expected THINKfast was not going to be easy, but I thought I could do it. Thanks to many helpers, everything went smoothly. In addition to many activities, we had various speakers who told us about poverty and injustice all around the world. We certainly have a better understanding about the poverty of the world. We do not get the extent of poverty here in Canada. THINKfast was a hard thing to do, but a very educational because we learned about the poor.

# **History Corner**

Instructions for the Reverend Sister Directress of St. Charles Convent

*Memorandum written by Archibishop Langevin, November 21, 1906* 

You must organize the class programs.

A) First of all, the students have to be graded according to their ability. See to it as soon as possible and consult the teachers.

B) You must be very careful in your choice of text books. You could check this out with the Holy Names Sisters in St. Boniface. You must find a good method for the teaching of spelling. I find the best one is the one put out by the Brothers of the Cross of Jesus from St. Jean-Baptiste and St. Pierre.

C) You must supervise the teaching of the Catechism so that it will be well taught. The children whom you are preparing to receive Holy Communion either for this year or next year should be in the same class, and separated only when the time comes for the immediate preparation. The Catechism should be divided into three or four parts and the children must learn it word for word.

D) You must have the children sing religious and national hymns: "The Maple Leaf", and "Nearer My God to Thee", "Vive le people Canadien", "God Save the King", "L'ombre s'etend sur la terre".

E) The children must say prayers at the beginning !

and at the end of the school day. A short silence should precede these times of prayer

F) You must teach the children how to stand, how to sit and how to kneel. They must also learn to take their ranks according to their grades, when the signal is given.

<u>G)</u> It would be good to set aside a time during the week when the boarders and if possible the externs, would be taught how <u>to sew</u> and how <u>to keep house.</u>

H) You must foster good manners, good posture, and good speech. The students should have time to learn how to speak in public and to recite.
